Reaching all residents of Tibshelf, no matter if they are online or not, people get to hear about Parish Council matters and what is happening in the wider community. After 40 editions, we thought it was time to reflect on this vital channel of communication.

The newsletter has undergone a number of redesigns over the years, with each version having a better layout and design. We are constantly looking to improve the services we provide.

Chair's Address

Welcome to our Spring edition of the Tibshelf Parish Council newsletter.

Happy New Year to all our residents!!

When it comes to resolutions, January is a popular time for us all to get healthy and organised. It's also a great time to plan ahead – whether that's for yourself or your family and this is no different for the Parish Council. January is a great time for us to think and plan what we can do and what we can achieve in 2022, to support the village and our residents.

In our first newsletter of 2022, we have made some changes to allow us to bring you the latest information about the work of the Parish Council but have still included the local news stories from around the village. We are also seeking and asking for your views and opinions on some of the services we provide. We hope you like the changes and that you will take time to provide us with your constructive feedback?

One of the first decisions taken in the new year was to look and set the precept for the new financial year. The precept is the statutory sum of money provided to the Parish Council to use to fund and provide services, and at our meeting in early January the councillors present took the prudent decision to agree that we retain the Precept at last year's figure of £163,000. This means there will be no rise in the part of the Council Tax that covers the Parish Council. The councillors decided that the current balance,

along with the reserves and Covid grant funds, were sufficient to support improvements and proposed projects.

I believe we are all hoping that this year will see a decrease in current Covid rates and variants, which will allow us, while still being vigilant, to enjoy and plan holidays, attend more events and spend quality time with family and friends.

With this in mind, the planned Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations are something I am sure we want to see and be enjoyed by all and present another fantastic opportunity to celebrate as a village. This is one event the Parish Council do not want to pass by without being involved..... perhaps with an event like a 'Picnic & Party in the Park' and if you like the sound of that, watch out for more details in our next newsletter on our Facebook page and on our website.

What's being discussed at Tibshelf Parish Council



Tibshelf Parish Council meetings are the main way decisions are made, and in this new section of the newsletter, we'd like to keep you informed of what is discussed.

In October, a health and safety report was given to the council, and plans were made for the first Health and Safety Committee meeting and a training session for members. The fire alarm and fixed wire testing at the Village Hall had taken place. The Parish Council bought 7 horse chestnut trees to go at the Shetland Road recreational ground, as part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Plans were made for the Remembrance period, including placing the Tommie silhouettes, removing the hanging baskets, and putting up the poppies on lamp posts. An update was given on the Christmas trees and village lights, and councillors approved allowing the COVID-19

community testing unit to use the Village Hall car park until December. The council considered a quote for the hanging baskets and recommended getting more quotes to assess value for money. The external audit report was noted. The council delayed publication of the Winter Edition of Tibshelf News until more information was known about community events following a COVID-19 spike. Neighbourhood planning exhibition leaflets had been purchased.

In November, it was reported that the Christmas Craft Fayre and Remembrance Sunday had both been held and were well attended. Councillors were updated on the upcoming Christmas lights switch-on, Kids Christmas Activity Day and Parish Carol Concert. The bench at Rock House

corner was discussed and quotes would be obtained for either repairing the seat with resin, or buying one or two new seats outright. An update was given on the Queen's Jubilee trees. A few small willow trees were in the way of where the new trees need to go. It would be looked at to see if they should be removed. Councillors put themselves forward to join the Pavillion/ Recreation Sports Ground Working Party. The football clubs and food bank would be invited. A request to plant a tree in the cemetery was granted, and councillors saw a report on dog walking byelaws that covered the Shetland Road Recreation Ground. Councillors voted to no longer receive an annual allowance of £169.89, and voted to sponsor for £250 the Tibshelf Community School's production of Billy Elliot. The Winter Edition of Tibshelf News was approved and distribution to residents would go ahead. The council voted to display recycling poster competition winners in various locations. It was reported that the Neighbourhood Plan exhibition was going ahead.

In December, it was reported that the Parish Carol Concert would be going ahead. Cllr Sue Wood was thanked for the Activities for Kids event. The bench on Rock House corner had been removed and a bench dedicated to the NHS will go there, along with new planters. The COVID-19 grant proposals from the public would be discussed at the next Finance Committee. ➔

What's being discussed continued

The draft budget 2022/23 would also be discussed at a meeting in the first week of January. It was agreed to pay £550 to repair the Church clock. A section 137 grant application was received from Derbyshire Unemployed Workers Centre for £200. The full amount was granted so they could continue their good work. A report was received from the Communication and Projects Officer that outlined the Spring 2022 newsletter production schedule. The Officer had spoken with a representative of Tibshelf Community School and provided a summary of the meeting and the opportunities a closer working partnership could provide. An update was given on the latest number of bookings for the Parish Carol Concert.

Tibshelf Parish Council meetings are held on the third Tuesday of the month, excluding August. They begin at 7pm and last until 9pm, unless councillors agree to a time extension. There are also meetings of the Resources Committee, Village Hall Management Committee, Finance Committee and the Neighbourhood Planning Steering Group.

Parish Council meeting minutes are usually approved at the next Parish Council meeting. If amendments or adjustments are requested by councillors, it could take a further month.

Staffing Changes at Tibshelf Parish Council

Starting in January 2022, Tibshelf Parish Council began using the services of a new Locum Parish Clerk, Peter Leppard.

The Parish Council took the decision to temporarily split the role of Parish Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer (RFO) into two roles, with Peter being the new Locum Parish Clerk.

Peter, also at Bamford Parish Council, joins Tibshelf and brings with him a wealth of experience and expertise. Originally working in the railway sector, Peter has worked as a Parish Clerk for 8 years and has a degree in local government administration.

Susan Coldwell, the former Locum Parish Clerk and RFO, has taken on the new Locum RFO role. Peter will be in the office on Wednesdays and will work remotely other days of the week. Susan will work Tuesdays in the office and remote at other times. The current office hours of 9am-1pm Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday will be unaffected.

In other news, it is sad to report that Terry Redman, our employed litter picker, has retired from the council. We would like to thank him for his decades long service to the Parish Council and want him to enjoy his well deserved retirement.

We want your views on the hanging baskets



The hanging baskets have been a prominent feature of the High Street for a number of years. However, we want to hear from you about what you think of them and if they should continue in their current form.

The Parish Council recently set the annual budget and precept for the year 2022/23, and has decided to not go ahead with the hanging baskets for 2022. The Council wants instead to ask the public for your views, and conduct a review of which locations are the best for baskets.

At a typical cost of £10,000 per year, they make up a substantial portion of the annual budget. Money is also spent on the baskets being regularly watered.

We want to hear from you about what you think we should do for 2023. An online survey has

been made to ask if you want a) a full display as normal, b) review of the locations and have fewer baskets, or c) no longer have them at all. The SurveyMonkey link is:

New bench on Rock House corner dedicated to NHS

Unfortunately the bench at Rock House corner had been damaged and needed either repairing or replacing. Tibshelf Parish Council has opted for a new bench that has engravings dedicated to the NHS.

The Parish Council has discussed doing something special to honour and remember those who have worked so hard throughout the pandemic, and those sadly lost during it. The need for a new bench gave the opportunity to create a lasting tribute.

Discussions originally centred on repairing the bench with recycled plastic or resin. However, it was soon clear that this would cost as much as a new one. The memorial bench is 5ft wide and 3ft high and has laser cut designs of paramedics, doctors and nurses. One message reads 'Thank you to our amazing NHS staff'.

The Parish Council has also discussed cleaning up the general area, removing brambles and having planters to brighten up the space. The £830 cost of the bench and planters will come from the COVID-19 grant fund.

Cllr Phil Billington, whose idea it was and who ordered the bench, said "The last bench was past its sell-by date. I would also like to thank the Parish Rangers who removed the old bench and ensured the concrete based was sound".

A key part of helping the environment, and ensuring that waste is placed in the appropriate place, is to not litter.

We've already seen several brilliant litter pick campaigns in the village over the past couple of years, and want to thank those who have taken part and helped clean up the village.

Litter picking of pavements is a service that is provided by Tibshelf Parish Council and Bolsover District Council. The less we litter, the less council tax money must be spent on picking it up.

By having a cleaner and healthier place to live, animals are also protected from ingesting or getting trapped in rubbish and money is saved.



Lian Kingscott, an admin of the Tibshelf Resident's Action Group on Facebook, decided to set up a JustGiving page to allow residents to help cover the estimated £1,000 damage. The costs may otherwise need to come out of Church funds.

Thankfully, this target was immediately met when local business Dennis Rye Ltd very generously offered to pay the amount in full.

As a result of this welcome act, the JustGiving campaign was switched to raise funds for the broken central heating at St John the Baptists. In the week leading up to the Parish Carol Concert on Monday 20th December 2021, the heating had stopped working, prompting the Parish Council to have to warn those attending the event to wrap up warm.

The costs of repair were estimated at £1,200. In the first day of the campaign alone, £790 was raised by over 30 people donating. At the time of writing, the campaign has exceed its target and £1,304 has been raised by 51 donators. A further £530 has also been received in cash.

Community spirit shown by Church fundraising efforts

Following an online appeal for donations, St John the Baptist Church will receive over £2,800 towards repairing the vandalised lychgate and the broken heating system inside the Church.

On the 5th of January 2022, representatives of the Church informed the public that the lychgate had been ripped from it's hinges overnight. This rightly caused outrage among residents, with one person writing "Absolutely disgusting, Why would someone even do that?" Another said "Absolutely shameful. I hope they are caught and made to pay for the damage and repair"



Rev Gill Manly, Vicar of St John the Baptist Church, said "On behalf of the congregation at St John the Baptist Church, Tibshelf, I would like to thank everyone who gave a donation for the repair of the lych gate and heating. We were all deeply saddened to see the needless damage to the gates, especially as they had been so recently renovated by Ian Kerry and Ivan Brentnall. Then we were so touched and encouraged by the kind thoughts that were expressed on social media and the offers of help that were given. Thank you to Wayne and Lian Kingscott for coordinating the fund raising. I can't put into words how much the donations have meant to us all at the Church. I pray that God will bless you all for your generosity and support."

Horse Chestnuts have been planted to honour the coming Jubilee



On February 6th 2022, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II will have been on the throne for 70 years, longer than any other British monarch, bettering her great great grandmother Queen Victoria's 64 years reign (1837-1901) by six years. The only other

British monarch who came anywhere near was King George III, Queen Elizabeth's great great great grandfather whose reign lasted for almost 60 years (1760-1820).

Her Majesty's Platinum Anniversary is therefore a unique milestone in the history of our island and probably unlikely to be surpassed. She became the Queen at the age of 25, on the death of her father King George VI during the night of February 5th/6th 1952, whilst she was in Kenya on a world tour. She returned home immediately.

To commemorate the Platinum Jubilee, the Parish Council decided to plant seven horse chestnut trees. The choice of tree, the horse chestnut (*Aesculus hippocastanum*), fondly remembered by generations of children as a conker tree has a historical reason. In 1901, to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, several horse chestnut trees were planted adjacent to the "backs" of St. Thomas Row. They were planted by the then owners of the Sports Ground, the Babbington Coal Company Ltd. Sadly over time some of these trees have become diseased and as a result have died or become dangerous and have been removed.

The Parish Council considered it appropriate to replace those that have been removed and supplement those that have survived. Because of the historical association with horse chestnut trees, it was thought apt to plant the same species. Accordingly, seven horse chestnut trees have been planted in the same location, one tree for each decade of Her Majesty's reign. An appropriately worded explanatory plaque will be placed near the trees.



Here's a bit of horse chestnut tree trivia. "why are they called horse chestnut trees?".

There are two reasons:

- i) Because of the horse shoe shaped scar, complete with "nail holes", left when the leaf detaches itself in the Autumn.
- ii) Powdered horse chestnuts were used to cure horses of coughs.

But beware, horse chestnuts shouldn't be eaten as they can make you sick and they have a bitter taste. They're good for a game of "conkers" though!

Christmas Activity Day



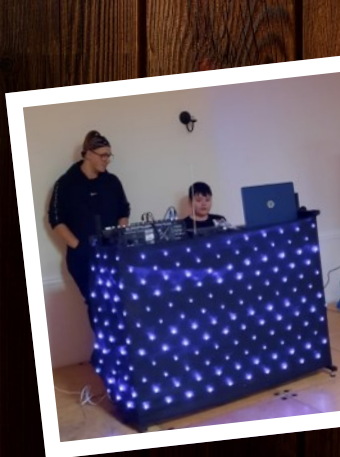
On Saturday 11th December, the Village Hall welcomed children from Tibshelf for the Christmas activity day.

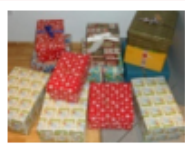


TIBSHELF COMMUNITY SCHOOL

Children in Need 2021


